

SEATTLE, **WA** – Pacific Northwest Ballet School is delighted to continue its annual family matinee offerings with *Harold and the Purple Crayon*, an adaptation of Crockett Johnson's beloved 1955 book, featuring music by Andrew Bird and choreographed by Robyn Mineko Williams and Terence Marling. This hour-long, narrated production features performances by PNB School students and is the perfect introduction to ballet for young theatregoers. (*Harold...* does not feature PNB Company dancers.) Bring the whole family and watch as Harold draws, and dances through, a landscape full of wonder and excitement. *Harold and the Purple Crayon* runs for five performances at Seattle Center's McCaw Hall. Showtimes are at 12:30 and 3:30 pm on Saturday, March 23, and 10:30 am and 1:30 pm on Saturday, March 30, with a special sensory-friendly performance at 4:30 pm on Saturday, March 30. PROGRAM NOTES

One evening, after thinking it over for some time, Harold decided to go for a walk in the moonlight. So begins *Harold and the Purple Crayon*, the first of seven delightful picture books by Crockett Johnson, following the adventures of an inventive young boy. As it turned out, there wasn't any moon that night nor was there a path to walk on, so Harold simply drew them. And thus his journey began. Resourceful and brave, Harold creates the world he wants to explore, using nothing more than a big purple crayon and his sky's-the-limit imagination. The *Harold* books have captivated families for more than sixty years, celebrating the imagination of children and the unique way they see the world.

ARTIST BIOS

A native of the Chicago suburbs, **Andrew Bird** began playing violin at the age of four and graduated from Northwestern University in 1995. His career began in the 1990s with the swing band the Squirrel Nut Zippers. Bird has released sixteen studio albums, and is known for his unique violin playing, accompanied by loop and effect pedals, whistling, and voice. Bird's album "My Finest Work Yet" received a Grammy nomination for Best Folk Album in 2020. www.andrewbird.net/

Terence Marling is originally from Chicago. Marling began his ballet training in 1982 at the Ruth Page School of Dance under the direction of Larry Long. Marling joined Hubbard Street Dance Chicago in 2006 and danced with the company until his retirement from dancing in 2009 at which time he became artistic associate and rehearsal director for HSDC. In 2013, he was named director of Hubbard Street 2. As a freelance teacher, choreographer, and stager, Marling has restaged works by Alejandro Cerrudo and Ihsan Rustem, and taught at HSDC, Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, The Chicago High School for the Arts, and more. www.terencemarling.com/

Robyn Mineko Williams is from Chicago. She was a member of Hubbard Street Dance Chicago for 12 seasons. She began choreographing in 2001 for HSDC's Inside/Out Workshop and in 2010, alongside Terence Marling, co-choreographed *Harold and the Purple Crayon: A Dance Adventure*, for Hubbard Street 2. She has since been commissioned by HSDC, Grand Rapids Ballet, Visceral Dance Chicago, and The Nexus Project. For PNB, she created the premieres *The Trees The Trees* (2019) and *Before I Was* (2022). Her choreography has been presented at venues such as the Kennedy Center, American Dance Festival, and NYC's Joyce Theatre. She was a winner of Northwest Dance Project's International Choreography Competition in 2012 and was selected as an E-choreographer in 2013 for Springboard Danse Montreal. Williams is a recipient of the 2013 Princess Grace Choreographic Fellowship and a Princess Grace Foundation-USA 2014 Works In Progress Residency Grant. robynminekowilliams.com/
